Pine Trees in Gouache

In this workshop, we will explore the technique of painting pine branches and cones in gouache. Through a step-by-step approach, we will cover the process by creating initial sketches, building forms with light washes and dry brush, creating depth between foreground and background needles, and rendering light and shadow. Participants will concentrate on studies of small areas of pine branches to gain knowledge and confidence to illustrate a finished painting.

- Interion Brushes #4, #2, #0, #00 or any brushes you prefer
- Paint Palette

- Watercolor Paper (I recommend Fabriano Artistico Hot Press 300lb. cut to 14" x 17" and/or 11" x 14" pieces)
- Magnifying Glass
- Small Ruler or Tape Measure
- Clamping device to hold up pines. (I use Helping Hands, which can be found on many DIY websites.)
- · Battery operated OTT Light
- Hard Surface to attach your watercolor paper (foam core is fine)
