Glowing Red Peppers

In this class I would like to take you through the steps I use to achieve a bright and realistic Red pepper, (capsicum), in just a few washes and mixing the colors on the actual page, finishing with dry brush.



Pencils - HB, B or your usual selection
White plastic eraser
Kneadable eraser (grey)
Deep well palette, (you will need this)
Tracing paper
Drawing paper or pad for sketching and notes
Soft cloth for brush wiping
W&N masking fluid + inexpensive fine brush
2 water jars
Magnifying glass, hand held or other

Portable battery operated light such as OTT lites with day light bulb

White watercolour pencil, Caran D'ache (optional)

Paper: Arches Satine hot pressed 300gsm, you will need the thickness of this paper Paints: W&N, Schmincke, or any artist quality paints that you have, but for this class I will need you to have at least 3 reds

- Scarlet red (yellow red)
- Winsor red (pure red)
- Winsor red deep (dark red)
- * Cadmium lemon (cool)
- * Cadmium yellow (warm)
- * Cerulean blue
- * French ultramarine
- * Burnt sienna
- Permanent alizarin crimson
- Prussian blue

Brushes:

Artist quality sable brushes are the best # 4, 2, 0 Sable mix or a good synthetic in # 6, 8 Old brush for mixing

You may want to make a screen for your subject to prevent too many highlights, This can be done with two pieces of foam-core A3 size, taped along the long edge
