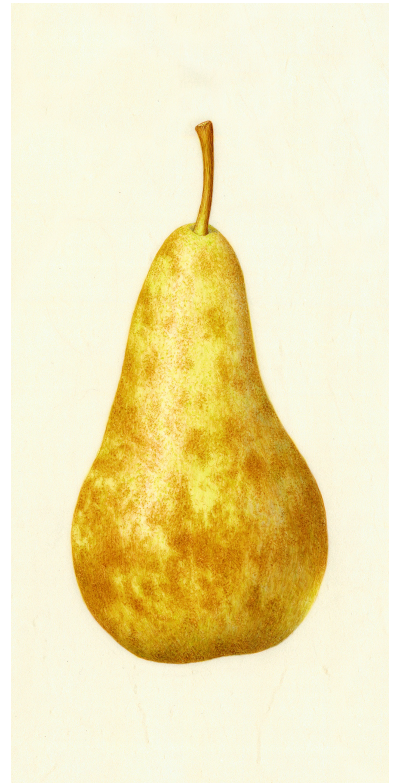

*Capture the glow of fall fruit by balancing highlights, shadows and reflected light to make your subject luminous. A variety of apples, pears, persimmons and pomegranates will be available. Catherine will teach you how to skillfully observe, measure and draw your subject, followed by careful and accurate color mixing. You are then ready to paint and capture the elegant shape, bold colors and textures using proper lighting to make your fruit come to life. **Open to all levels.***
